MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

This does not mean that nothing is happening. There is work going on on your behalf behind the scenes and over the internet. Work is continuing on the website under the coordination of Ann Buchanan and a volunteer team of programmers through the Mastercard Cares program.

Much work has been done in the Library over the last few years under the direction and watchful eyes of Past President Eunice Robinson and our Library Administrator, Corrine Jubb. The number of people coming into the library has increased about 7% per month, each month over the last couple of years. The chats and special interest groups have more attendees each month and are now able to enjoy live and recorded seminars on the new 65" TV.

I am looking forward to when we will be able to return to using our much upgraded library and all the resources in the library. Did you know that we have newsletters and journals from about 85 other genealogy organizations in our digital library? Something to look forward to in the (near) future.




NEWS from the LIBRARY STACKS




R 929.01'973 MAP GUIDE TO THE U.S. FEDERAL CENSUSES, 1790 - 1920

THO By William Thorndale and William Dollarhide

Even though we can find many things online, any book with William Dollarhide's name on it is definitely worth perusing in our research!! We're fortunate to have this very clear and detailed large soft-cover book by these two, in our BCGS Genealogical Library. The back page has a sample map [Minnesota 1857], with detailed explanations of the marks on maps, and codes used. Amazingly helpful. Note that the "R" in front of the library numbers shows it is a **Reference Book** only, and cannot be taken out.

I started off going through this book looking at the 1790 maps of only two of my American ancestors' home states, Pennsylvania [PA] below, and New York state [NY] above.





What you might find most useful is keeping track of the new boundaries of all the counties of a state, year by year of the Federal Censuses, with specific details on most pages. For example, I just checked Virginia [VA] and found a note stating for 1790 the Federal census was lost for all counties! This loss of the Federal censuses was also true for most VA counties over several following Census years.

Information such as these notes would save much frustration and confusion when researching. Example, "Albany County, NY" was that large in 1790-?! My ancestors' home base in 1790 - although stated as in Onondaga County, actually would be considered in Albany County - and that's where the records would most likely be kept.

Having this book open beside your computer would be very helpful as you track the migration - or apparent migration - of your ancestors every decade, watching the county lines change, and new counties added.

Not only is there a detailed **Contents** page, there is also an **Appendix**: "Pitfalls in Mapping Boundaries", as well as a **Bibliography**, and an **Index** of each County, by State. This is a very high quality Reference Book, and is highly recommended.







- (2) live in Surrey (see below if you live in Surrey but don't have a card)







Researching from Home

When I was doing research on the 1918 flu pandemic for the exhibit at PoCo Heritage's museum, I had no

inkling that we were on the brink of another world wide health crisis. (The exhibit was covered in the March 2020 BCGS newsletter.) Considering what I learned about those bygone times, it is much better to be weathering this storm in 2020 than the one that happened just over 100 years ago.

Like then, our social gatherings are on hold but now it is much easier to access the news about what is happening and to stay in touch through our phones and online. In fact, there are a proliferation of things being made available online for us family history types, even more than usual. Lately, Genealogy à la carte seems to send at least two emails a day with new webinars. I



don't really need more genealogy distractions but I'm tempted by webinars that might contain that little nugget of information that will get me further in my research.

But that's the thing, there is so much on offer and the ancestors I am researching tick so many boxes when it comes to location, occupation and social group. So, it's easy to get distracted from what I am working on with new research possibilities. Then too, there is only so much to be found online. Sometimes I need to turn to books to get particular information, which is hard when

all local libraries are closed. Although, if I really search, I might just find something in my own personal library.



While our present situation makes research more difficult, it also brings up more questions. When I did the research on the 1918 flu pandemic, I had fleeting questions about what my grandparents had experienced during that time. Now that I am living through something similar, I would like to find out more about how their lives were affected. Unfortunately, no family stories about that time have been handed down. It was only a chance remark made about Regina's 1912 Cyclone that made me aware of that disaster which subsequent research showed me my maternal grandfather had lived through. Can I find similar information about how he and my grandmother, newly married in 1918, fared during the pandemic in Regina?

The research into the flu that I have already done for the museum exhibit gave me some idea of what happened in Canada, but I don't know much about what happened in England where my paternal grandparents lived. In 1918, my grandmother had a number of children, my father was a toddler and her oldest son had served in the war as had her second husband, my grandfather. How had they all fared? Even if the stories haven't been handed down, there must be something I can find out.

WE ARE ALL RELATED

"Preston, have you ever eaten at Preston's Restaurant in Vancouver?" I asked. "Do you know what it is named after?" "No," my brother-in-law replied.

"It is named for Lord Stanley, who Stanley Park is named after. He was born here in Preston. Let's stop and take a look in the archives and see if your mother's birth is in there." "Oh, she came over as a baby. Her name won't be here."

We had arrived in England a few days earlier, on our way to the Hebrides, and were passing through Preston, on the northwest coast of England. "Yes, it will," I said. Although Paul, my brother-in-law, is not keen on family history, it o μ E his mother, so he was somewhat interested. We googled the archives' address and off we went.

"You know she came over on the Empress of Ireland in 1913, when she was four months old. It sank the next year, in a collision on the St. Lawrence. I guess nobody has ever heard of it because WW I started shortly after and consumed the news. It sank in fourteen minutes and over a thousand people died. You would think..."

"Oh, shoot, the Archives are closed on Monday. Let's look for a Catholic Church." So, again we googled and found five Catholic churches, which seemed strange for an English town. The drizzle was getting to us, but we had parked the car and although it seemed close by, it was many blocks



away and we almost gave up. We decided to go to the church with the tallest steeple.

As we arrived, we found a man gardening out front, and stopped to talk to him. He said he had been an altar boy at the church, but now was just a "Friend


of the Church". It seems there was a committee of 'lapsed

Catholics,' who didn't want the old church to crumble away and worked to raise money for renovations.

He said there were only seventy-five people in the congregation and no one was in a position to be a priest there. Finally, it was decided that two French Jesuits would come over, "who would do the services in Latin, including baptisms, marriages and deaths." As a "Friend of the Church", he wrote to the local bishop to explain that no one wanted services in Latin any more. We felt badly for this predicament.

There used to be at least eight cotton mills in the town and many of the workers had come over from Ireland for the

work, hence the large number of Catholic churches. Now the mills are all closed and the number of Catholics in the area much dwindled, so the churches are closing.



You could tell he loved the old church, called St. Walburge. The friend of the church



told us the steeple, at 94 metres, was the third highest in all England and invited us inside. He explained that as the town was booming in the mid-1800s and Catholics were again allowed to worship in England, a large amount of money was spent on the architect, as the church was originally planned to be a cathedral. He was Joseph Hansom, who also invented the 'hansom cab', a horse-drawn carriage for two.

The thirty-five foot stained glass windows were stunning, as was the rose window. There was a statue of an Anglo-Saxon king's daughter who became a missionary and was later to become St. Walburga. Most amazing were the open inside rafters, called 'hammer-beams' made like an upside down ship, with no pillars to block the view. Evidently, Hansom was at the London Docks watching the shipbuilding with Charles Dickens when he got this idea. Dickens later based his book "Hard Times", on Preston. We

asked if we could possibly see the birth records for the church. Unfortunately, they were stored in the local school and the school was closed for the summer. He said he could look up the name for my brother-in-law and get back to him.

"What is the name you wanted researched?" he asked. "It's my Mom, Ellen Swarbrick: she was born in November of 1912", Paul answered.

The man froze. "What did you say?" "Swarbrick", he repeated. The man hesitated a moment then said, "I thought that is what you said. That is **my** name. Joseph Swarbrick!" We all stood there with our mouths open.

Then we grabbed his arm and gave him big hugs. "This is amazing!"

In all my life, I had never heard of another person with the last name of Swarbrick, but here he was, with the same

maiden name as Paul's mother. "It is actually a fairly common name around here," he said.

Then we noticed that Paul and he had some similar facial features, especially the end of his nose, the same height, and similar age: different years, though. We talked a while longer and gave him our information and an email address. We walked away shaking our heads. We are home now and waiting...
